.sey z: Extended Problem of the Day Task - Partner students. Partner A creates a bar model of fractions that include halves, fourths and eighths, Partner B creates a bar model of fractions that include thirds, sixths and twelfths. They may use Cuisenaire rods, connecting cubes or paper strips to create their bar model, but they must both use the same manipulative and have the same size "one" whole. Each builds a number line using their bar model. Include numbers up to 3. Partners compare their two number lines.

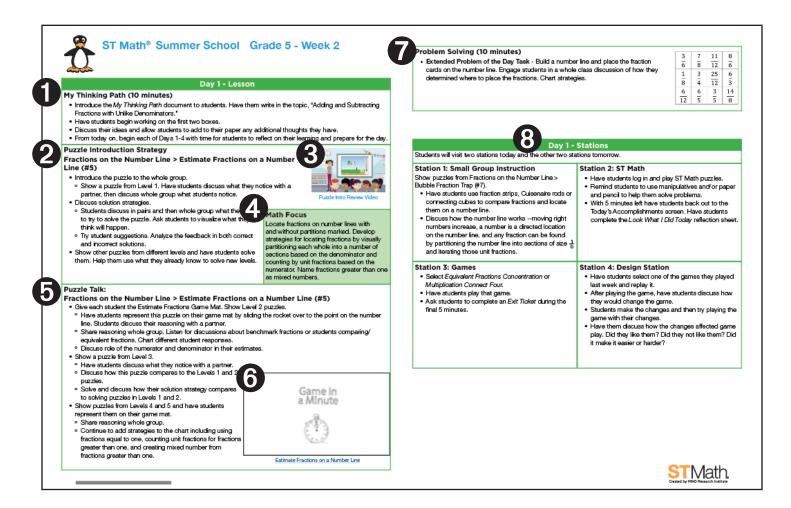
